



Hitchhikers guide to the galaxy by Douglas Adams


American Gods by Neil Gaiman

The strange case if Dr Jekyll and Mr Hyde by Robert Louis Stevenson





A BILLION-DOLLAR FORTUNE TO DIE FOR.



Soon she is caught in a deadly game that everyone in this strange family is playing. But just how far will they go to keep their fortune?




The Yellow Room by Jess Vallance

If you receive a letter telling you your father has died, what do you do?



A compelling tale about mothers and their daughters - and the lengths that some will go to, to make their dreams come true.




A Monster Calls by Patrick Ness

In every corner of every room is the phantom of his beautiful first wife, Rebecca, and the new Mrs de Winter walks in her shadow.

Hidden away in the Record Department of the sprawling Ministry of Truth, Winston Smith skilfully rewrites the past to suit the needs of the Party. Yet he inwardly rebels against the totalitarian world he lives in, which demands absolute obedience and controls him through the all-seeing telescreens and the watchful eye of Big Brother, symbolic head of the Party. In his longing for truth and liberty, Smith begins a secret love affair with a fellow-worker Julia, but soon discovers the true price of freedom is betrayal.
