Peer mentoring has been evidenced to have a positive impact on the emotional health and well-being of young people and support with behavioural and academic development.

This is why we have launched a new scheme which has seen Year 9 pupils apply to be trained as Peer Mentors, with a fantastic response rate.

The successful 15 recruits have been completing training sessions on topics such as communication techniques, listening skills and anti-bullying techniques. As we are nearing the end of the training course, it is fantastic to see the Peer Mentors growing in confidence in their role.



In due course, Peer Mentors will finish their course and receive their celebration, certificate and badges. The Peer Mentors will then be paired with Year 7 and Year 8 pupils who are struggling in different areas, to act as role models and provide further support.

To support this, a focus on improving numeracy skills takes place every fortnight during form time. These sessions include engaging activities designed to strengthen understanding and fluency in key mathematical concepts. For pupils who need additional support, we also run weekly interventions to help them overcome challenges in maths through tailored teaching and extra practice.

Regular use of Sparx helps to reinforce classroom learning and develop key skills.

Ensure your child logs into Sparx each week to complete their homework. Consistency is key to building confidence and fluency.

• Make Maths Part of Everyday Life:

Support numeracy with real-world activities, such as:

- Measuring ingredients while cooking.
- Adding up costs or working out discounts while shopping.
- Calculating distances and times during travel.

Experiments, competitions and options evenings – a busy term for the Science Department!


It's been an explosive term in Science so far, with our science club creating volcanoes and making them erupt with bicarbonate of soda and vinegar!

As this term ends, we take time to reflect on the progress pupils have made so far.Year 7 have developed strong ICTbased skills in using computers, getting to grips with the Moodle system.

The brand-new Year 10 cohort has worked exceptionally hard this term, delving deeper into the world of computers and covering a wide array of topics including computers, data representation and networks.

They have also developed their skills when facing exam questions. I am looking forward to continuing to work with them throughout this coming new year.

Writing Creatively at Houlton

Year 7 have read **'Boy 87' by Ele Fountain** and have begun focusing on descriptive writing to build mood and atmosphere for an environment like Shif's experience travelling precariously by ship to begin a different life in a new country.

Have a look at an extract written by Matthew in 7 Obama:

As the flames leaped and danced aggressively like a dance show, the brightness flashed and sprayed against the tent walls, lapping the edges off. The volcanic heat felt hellish. Horrific gasps of shock and agony came from the neighbouring structures. Soon after, everyone was choking. Everyone was evacuating like there was a lion chasing them...

Year 8 have read a modern adaptation of **'The Odyssey'** alongside focusing on informal letter writing and re-telling the story from the antagonist's (villain's) perspective.

Have a look at an extract written by Ruby in 8 Armstrong, re-telling the tale of Odysseus and Polyphemus, from the cyclops' perspective:

As I soundly slept in my homely cave, surrounded by my dear sheep, I suddenly heard a strange noise; peoplings. My heart skipped a beat. My sheep! My poor, poor sheep! I needed to protect them, my family. I could not let them take my family away. All I could do was trap them to save them, so I did. Quickly, I trapped those vile, soul-sucking, betraying, good for nothing peoplings. For my sheep, I would do anything. Even after giving them a friendly warning, those fools tried to deceive me! How unfair is that? All I wanted to do was protect my family, my flesh and blood. Then they had the audacity to stab me in the eye. How in the world am I meant to take care of my sheep?

They made me blind. I don't really even remember because those rodents drugged me. Well that was just the cherry on top. And still, after all of this, they escaped! So that no one else suffers because of the peoplings, I set a curse on them to protect everyone and my sheep.

Year 9 have read an abridged adaptation of the Victorian novel **'Jane Eyre'** and created their own spooky Gothic stories based on the use of the supernatural, pathetic fallacy and mystery in Brontë's novel.

Have a look at an extract written by Macie in 9 Armstrong (avert your eyes if you don't like descriptions of blood and gore!):

It was an eerie, blood-curdling, algid morning on the moors. The dark brown wooden bench she sat on was damp. All night it thundered, rain drowned the land coming down in buckets.

The next morning the land was filled with fluffy white snow almost too perfect to be real. Time ticked, thoughts drowning her in guilt. *"Why did I do this? I told myself I was better than this. Lies. Lies. Lies."*

She thought she was better than that. She was just tricking herself. Deep down she loved it. She could still taste the bitter, red liquid swimming in her mouth.

Bodies. Bodies. Bodies. The eerie mist of emptiness floundered over her. Baths of red liquid, still warm, splattered the white fluffy snow, running all over the moors like a flooded river. The air fresh, thunder puddled down.

"Why, why, why? Am I really this stupid?" She was all by herself, drowning alive with loneliness and guilt. She didn't need to be afraid of it; she just needed to talk to it. She took a backseat in her own world trying to save what she had already done. Temptation, temptation, temptation. What would she do now? What could she do? Run away...

Year 10 have finished studying their modern play '**An Inspector Calls'** by JB Priestley. Pupils have not only learnt more about life in the Edwardian and Victorian eras but also focused on the huge societal changes post-war, and how even now society can still be seen to covet old fashioned values and systems. Who is really to blame for the death of Eva Smith? We all have a different answer. What does your child think?


A Memorable Visit to Duxford: Exploring History at the Imperial War Museum

This term, pupils embarked on an exciting journey to the Imperial War Museum in Duxford. Known as one of the largest aviation museums in Europe, the site provided an incredible opportunity to explore history, engineering, and the bravery of those who served in various conflicts.

The trip began with a guided tour of the museum's expansive hangars. The first stop was the AirSpace exhibit, home to iconic British aircraft like the Spitfire and the Concorde. Pupils were amazed to see these engineering marvels up close, especially the Spitfire, which played a pivotal role in World War II. Some pupils even stepped inside the Concorde to experience the luxury and innovation that made it one of the fastest passenger planes in history.

Next, the group moved to the Battle of Britain Hangar, where they learned about the heroic pilots who defended Britain during World War II. Interactive displays and personal stories brought the history to life, helping pupils appreciate the courage and sacrifices made during this critical time. The Ops Block was a particular highlight, providing a reconstruction taking pupils to the very heart of Duxford during a crisis moment in British history.

The highlight for many was the American Air Museum. This impressive hangar showcases American aircraft from World War II to the present day, including the massive B-52 Stratofortress bomber. Pupils were struck by the scale of the planes and the stories of the soldiers who served alongside their British counterparts.



As the trip came to an end, pupils reflected on the lessons they had learned—not just about planes and history, but about innovation, resilience, and the human stories behind the machines. The visit to Duxford was more than an educational outing; it was an inspiring journey into the past that connected history with the present

Geography – A Term in Review

The Geography Department would like to thank the pupils for all their hard work this half term! Students have been looking at a range of topics in class:

Year 7 pupils have been looking at global issues including climate change, flooding and how to mitigate against the issues caused. They have gained an appreciation of the key issues the world faces.

Year 8 classes have been looking at development and inequalities, particularly the problems associated with conflict minerals. They have looked at the Democratic African Republic as an example of a country in Africa.

Year 9 has been looking at issues created by the world's resources consumption, looking at food, water and energy as examples. They have gained an appreciation that we all need to do our part to use the world's dwindling resources in a more sustainable way.

Geographers in **Year 10** have been looking at the rivers unit of the AQA course. They have studied the key processes, landforms and management of rivers and have completed case studies on the River Tees and management of the River Cherwell at Banbury.

Exploring Big Questions and Celebrating the Season

This term, Religious Education (RE) at Houlton School is full of excitement as pupils dive into new topics, building on their knowledge and curiosity. Across all year groups, we are tackling big questions that challenge pupils to explore, reflect, and engage with a range of beliefs and practices.

KS3: New Topics, New Insights

Year 7: Pupils are exploring the Big Question "What fundamental beliefs set Christianity apart from other major world religions?" This topic encourages them to examine the core principles of Christianity and how these differ from other faiths they have studied so far.

Year 8: Delving into Islam, pupils are unpacking "What are the key pillars and beliefs that form the foundation of Islam?" Discussions will focus on the Five Pillars of Islam and their importance to Muslim life and practice.

Year 9: The focus shifts to Hinduism with the question "What is the essence of Hinduism, and how does it influence the lives of its followers?" Pupils will explore key concepts such as dharma, karma, and moksha, gaining an understanding of how these shape Hindu practices and values.

After completing a week of assessments, keen to engage with these new topics, bringing fresh energy and curiosity to their lessons.

Short course RE GCSE: A Strong Start for Year 10

Year 10 pupils have made an excellent start to their Short Course GCSE in RE, finishing their first term with an in-depth study of Christian beliefs. They have been examining key ideas such as the Trinity, creation, and the attributes Christians use to describe God. These foundational concepts provide a strong basis for their continued exploration of faith, ethics, and philosophy.

Preparing for Christmas

With the festive season fast approaching, all year groups will also reflect on the significance of Christmas. From its meaning to Christians as a celebration of Jesus' birth to its cultural impact on believers and non-believers alike, this will be a chance to consider the holiday's deeper messages of hope, peace, and generosity.


At Houlton, we take pride in creating a safe and engaging environment where pupils can explore the richness of world religions while

'Calling It Out' Performance and Workshop

As part of our ongoing commitment to promoting respect and equality, Year 9 pupils recently attended a powerful performance and workshop called Calling It Out, delivered by the Loudmouth Theatre Company.

The session focused on tackling harmful sexual behaviour and emphasised the importance of non-tolerance in our school community.

The performance explored the impact of everyday incidents of sexual harassment and assault, especially on girls and young women. It provided a safe space for pupils to discuss these issues, reflecting on where these behaviours come from and exploring alternative, positive ways to interact. The accompanying workshop encouraged pupils to think critically about how to challenge and report such behaviour safely, reinforcing that everyone has a role to play in creating a safer environment.

Pupils were fully engaged throughout the performance, listening attentively and participating in the discussions that followed. The feedback from the session was overwhelmingly positive, with many pupils expressing how the experience had helped them better understand the importance of respect and how to stand up against harmful behaviour.

We are proud of the way our Year 9 pupils responded to this important topic and will continue to build on this learning as part of our wider PHRSE curriculum.

We have had another lovely term in our department, full of wonderful smells, flavours and interesting creations.


Year 7 pupils have been focusing on chopping skills, learning the brunoise and julienne techniques to include in calzones.
