The science labs have been buzzing with activity across all key stages this term!

Our Key Stage 3 Science Club members have embraced engineering challenges, focusing on aerodynamics by building and testing paper planes and creating inventive cardboard contraptions. Meanwhile,

Year 7 students have turned into forensic investigators, using their developing chemistry skills to analyse evidence and solve a thrilling 'murder mystery'—a practical and engaging way to learn.

Year 8 has been delving into the crucial topic of energy, exploring transformations and conservation with hands-on experiments, and **Year 9** students are tackling biology, focusing on the intricate structure and function of the skeletal system.

Year 10 has made a strong start to their GCSE courses, getting to grips with new and challenging concepts across physics, chemistry, and biology.

Finally, **Year 11** students are in full exam preparation mode! The department is running practical revision sessions every Thursday to hone their laboratory skills and consolidate their knowledge in preparation for their upcoming mock exams. Keep up the great work, everyone!

Computer Science

A new year at Houlton has begun, and the sound of clacking keys once again fills the Computer Science rooms.

Development of Moodle continues, with the new Year 7 cohort having been introduced to Moodle along with lessons on file management, passwords and searching the web. We've also looked at ways to stay safe online and why the age limit for social media is 13+, including apps like Instagram, WhatsApp and TikTok.

I would recommend that parents/carers and guardians read this article about this important topic on CEOP's website www.ceopeducation.co.uk/parents/articles/is-my-child-ready-for-social-media.

Year 8 have started the year revisiting the internals of a computer system before starting to look at how games are created. With our recent delivery of sample computers, we will be looking at this topic again in the future, with students being able to take apart and physically investigate the internals first-hand. This forms part of our long-term project with students creating a

'choose your own adventure' game in Python. This term we have focused on the planning section of game creation, for example, choosing themes, settings, objectives, etc. This also includes some media-based work, such as creating mood boards. Working with our English department we have selected four possible stories: the Cyclops, Scylla and Charybdis, the Lotus Eaters and Circe's Island.

Year 9 started this term looking at networks and communication. Learning about how data is transmitted and how networks are created using different topologies, with students developing their understanding by applying their knowledge to real world situations.

We have also tackled the misconception that internet speed is determined by available bandwidth. The speed provided by your internet service provider is always the same, but bandwidth allows us to move the data from point A to point B at a higher rate. We also discussed this in real-life terms and what students would be seeing if they were streaming a show on their favourite streaming service.

Year 10 have started working on their GCSE in Computer Science, focusing on computer components and then programming,

whilst Year 11 are focusing on developing their programming skills and revising for their upcoming Mocks. Both Year 10 and 11 have access to Smart Revise, which provides them with exam-style questions and forms part of their homework and revision.

Social Sciences

It has been a busy and exciting half-term in the Social Sciences Department, with students across Health and Social Care, Psychology, and Sociology developing their understanding of people and society through engaging, hands-on learning.

In Year 10, Health and Social Care students have been exploring how individuals grow and change across the life stages by making their very own "PIES" - no baking involved! The acronym stands for physical, intellectual, emotional, and social development, and has helped students understand how each area contributes to overall wellbeing.

In Psychology, both year groups have been busy thinking about the mind and behaviour in action. Year 10 Psychology students have been taking on the roles of both researcher and participant, investigating the capacity of short-term memory (STM). By conducting their own experiments, students have been able to experience first-hand how psychological research is carried out - developing both their scientific and analytical skills along the way.

Meanwhile, Year 11 Psychology students have been delving into the fascinating world of visual illusions - discovering how our brains can sometimes trick us into seeing things that aren't quite what they seem. They've explored how perception works and what these illusions reveal about the incredible complexity of the human brain.



Year 10 Sociology students have been introduced to key sociological perspectives that shape our understanding of the world, such as Functionalism, Marxism, and Feminism, alongside learning about key research methods that sociologists use to study social life. While Year 11 students have been examining patterns of educational achievement among different groups in society, exploring how factors such as class, gender, and ethnicity can influence success in school.

Across all subjects, our students have shown great enthusiasm - we're proud of their hard work and can't wait to see what the next half term brings!

Key Stage 3: Building the Foundations of Geography

Our Year 7 students have made a start to their Geography learning this term by exploring the question: "What is a Geographer?"

They've been developing essential geographical skills, including map reading, scale interpretation, and grid referencing. These skills have been put into practice using Ordnance Survey maps, helping students understand how geographers use spatial data to make sense of the world around them.

In Year 8, the focus has turned to weather and climate. Students have been learning how to interpret weather data, identify climate patterns, and understand how these influence our daily lives. To bring this learning to life, the department will soon be conducting a microclimate investigation around the school site - a fantastic

opportunity for students to collect data and apply their classroom learning outdoors.

Our Year 9 geographers have been tackling one of the most pressing issues of our time: climate change. They've been exploring global and local impacts and studying key mitigation and adaptation strategies. To conclude the unit, students were challenged to think creatively - designing their own innovative ideas for combating climate change in the future.

Key Stage 4: Developing Deeper Geographical Understanding

Our Year 10 students have made a strong start to their AQA GCSE Geography course,

focusing on the dynamic topic of Coasts. They have explored coastal processes, landforms, and management strategies, building both their knowledge and their exam skills. As the half term approaches, Year 10 will have sat their first end-of-topic assessment, marking an important milestone in their GCSE studies.

Year 11 students have also been delving into the Changing Economic World unit, with detailed case studies on Nigeria, Jamaica, and the UK. These lessons have encouraged them to think critically about global development, inequality, and the role of international trade and aid. In addition, Year 11 have successfully completed their fieldwork in Hunstanton and the London Olympic Park this term, gathering valuable data and experiences to support their AQA Paper 3 preparation.

We are all incredibly proud of the effort and curiosity our students have shown so far. Well done from all of us in the Geography Department for a fantastic start to the new year.


Our Year 7 students have also been learning these essential lifesaving skills, ensuring that every student has the opportunity to feel confident and capable of helping others in a medical emergency.
